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## THE MASS OF THE W BOSON

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Till 1995 the production and study of the $W$ boson was the exclusive domain of the $\bar{p} p$ colliders at CERN and FNAL. $W$ production in these hadron colliders is tagged by a high $p_{T}$ lepton from $W$ decay. Owing to unknown parton-parton effective energy and missing energy in the longitudinal direction, the experiments reconstruct only the transverse mass of the $W$ and derive the $W$ mass from comparing the transverse mass distribution with Monte Carlo predictions as a function of $M_{W}$.

Beginning 1996 the energy of LEP increased to above 161 GeV , the threshold for $W$-pair production. A precise knowledge of the $e^{+} e^{-}$centre of mass energy enables one to reconstruct the $W$ mass even if one of them decays leptonically. At LEP two methods have been used to obtain the $W$ mass. In the first method the measured $W$-pair production cross sections, $\sigma\left(e^{+} e^{-} \rightarrow W^{+} W^{-}\right)$, have been used to determine the $W$ mass using the predicted dependence of this cross section on $M_{W}$ (see Fig. 1). At 161 GeV , which is just above the $W$-pair production threshold, this dependence is a much more sensitive function of the $W$ mass than at the higher energies ( 172 to 208 GeV ) at which LEP has run during 1996-2000. In the second method, which is used at the higher energies, the $W$ mass has been determined by directly reconstructing the $W$ from its decay products.

Each LEP experiment has combined their own mass values properly taking into account the common systematic errors. In order to compute the LEP average $W$ mass each experiment has provided its measured $W$ mass for the $q q q q$ and $q q \ell \nu$ channels at each center-of-mass energy along with a detailed break-up of errors (statistical and uncorrelated, partially correlated and fully correlated systematics [1]). These have been properly combined to obtain a preliminary LEP $W$ mass = $80.446 \pm 0.040 \mathrm{GeV}$ [2]. Errors due uncertainties in LEP energy ( 17 MeV ) and possible effect of color reconnection (CR) and Bose-Einstein (BE) correlations between quarks from different $W$ 's ( 40 MeV and 25 MeV respectively) are included. The mass difference between $q q q q$ and $q q \ell \nu$ final states (due to possible CR and BE effects) is $+18 \pm 46 \mathrm{MeV}$.

The two Tevatron experiments have also carried out the exercise of identifying common systematic errors and averaging with CERN UA2 data obtain an average $W$ mass [3]= $80.452 \pm 0.062 \mathrm{GeV}$.

Combining all the published and unpublished $p-\bar{p}$ Collider and LEP results yields an average $W$-boson mass of $80.448 \pm 0.034 \mathrm{GeV}$ assuming no common systematics between LEP and hadron collider measurements.

The Standard Model prediction from the electroweak fit, excluding the direct $W$ mass measurements from LEP and Tevatron, gives a $W$-boson mass of $80.368 \pm 0.023 \mathrm{GeV}$.

OUR EVALUATION in the listing below is obtained by combining only published LEP and $p-\bar{p}$ Collider results using the same procedure as above.

## W WIDTH

The CDF and $\mathrm{D} \emptyset$ widths labelled "extracted value" are obtained by measuring $R=[\sigma(W) / \sigma(Z)]\left[\Gamma\left(W \rightarrow \ell \nu_{\ell}\right)\right] /(\mathrm{B}(Z \rightarrow \ell \ell) \Gamma(W))$ where the bracketed quantities can be calculated with plausible reliability. $\Gamma(W)$ is then extracted by using a value of $\mathrm{B}(Z \rightarrow \ell \ell)$ measured at LEP. The UA1 and UA2 widths used $R=[\sigma(W) / \sigma(Z)]\left[\Gamma\left(W \rightarrow \quad \ell \nu_{\ell}\right) / \Gamma(Z \rightarrow\right.$ $\ell \ell)] \Gamma(Z) / \Gamma(W)$ and the measured value of $\Gamma(Z)$. The Standard Model prediction is $2.067 \pm 0.021$ (ROSNER 94).

## TRIPLE GAUGE COUPLINGS (TGC'S)

Revised March 2000 by C. Caso (Univ. of Genova) and A. Gurtu (Tata Inst.)

Fourteen independent couplings, 7 each for $Z W W$ and $\gamma W W$, completely describe the $V W W$ vertices within the most general framework of the electroweak Standard Model (SM) consistent with Lorentz invariance and $U(1)$ gauge invariance. Of each of the 7 TGC's, 3 conserve $C$ and $P$ individually, 3 violate $C P$, and one TGC violates $C$ and $P$ individually while conserving $C P$. Assumption of $C$ and $P$ conservation and electromagnetic gauge invariance reduces the independent $V W W$ couplings to five: one common set is $\left(\kappa_{\gamma}, \kappa_{Z}, \lambda_{\gamma}, \lambda_{Z}, g_{1}^{Z}\right)$, where $\kappa_{\gamma}=\kappa_{Z}=g_{1}^{Z}=1$ and $\lambda_{\gamma}=\lambda_{Z}=0$ in the Standard Model at the tree level. The $W$ magnetic dipole moment, $\mu_{W}$, and the $W$ electric quadrupole moment, $q_{W}$, are expressed as $\mu_{W}=e\left(1+\kappa_{\gamma}+\lambda_{\gamma}\right) / 2 M_{W}$ and $q_{W}=-e\left(\kappa_{\gamma}-\lambda_{\gamma}\right) / M_{W}^{2}$.

Precision measurements of suitable observables at LEP1 has already led to an exploration of much of the TGC parameter space. Three linear combinations of the TGC's, $\alpha_{W \phi}, \alpha_{B \phi}$ and $\alpha_{W}$, have been proposed to investigate the leftover "blind" directions in the $C P$-conserving TGC parameter space, and two linear couplings, $\widetilde{\alpha}_{B W}$ and $\widetilde{\alpha}_{W}$ in the $C P$-violating TGC parameter space (see e.g., papers by Hagiwara [1], Bilenky [2], and Gounaris [3,4]). The relations between these parameters and those contained in the above set, expressed as deviations from the SM, are $\Delta g_{1}^{Z}=\alpha_{W \phi} / c_{w}^{2}, \Delta \kappa_{\gamma}=\alpha_{W \phi}+\alpha_{B \phi}, \Delta \kappa_{Z}=$ $\alpha_{W \phi}-t_{w}^{2} \alpha_{B \phi}$ and $\lambda_{\gamma}=\lambda_{Z}=\alpha_{W}$, where $c_{w}$ and $t_{w}$ are the cosine and tangent of the electroweak mixing angle. Similarly, $\widetilde{\kappa}_{\gamma}=\widetilde{\alpha}_{B W}, \widetilde{\kappa}_{Z}=t_{w}^{2} \widetilde{\alpha}_{B W}$ and $\widetilde{\lambda}_{\gamma}=\widetilde{\lambda}_{Z}=\widetilde{\alpha}_{W}$ within the $C P-$ violating sector. The LEP Collaborations have recently agreed to express their results directly in terms of the parameters $\Delta g_{1}^{Z}$, $\Delta \kappa_{\gamma}$ and $\lambda_{\gamma}$.

At LEP2 the $V W W$ coupling arises in $W$-pair production via $s$-channel exchange or in single $W$ production via the radiation of a virtual photon off the incident $e^{+}$or $e^{-}$. At the TEVATRON hard photon bremstrahlung off a produced $W$ or $Z$ signals the presence of a triple gauge vertex. In order to extract the value of one TGC the others are generally kept fixed to their SM values.

## W ANOMALOUS MAGNETIC MOMENT ( $\Delta \kappa$ )

The full magnetic moment is given by $\mu_{W}=e(1+\kappa+\lambda) / 2 m_{W}$. In the Standard Model, at tree level, $\kappa=1$ and $\lambda=0$. Some papers have defined $\Delta \kappa=1-\kappa$ and assume that $\lambda=0$. Note that the electric quadrupole moment is given by $-e(\kappa-\lambda) / m_{W}^{2}$. A description of the parameterization of these moments and additional references can be found in HAGIWARA 87 and BAUR 88. The parameter $\Lambda$ appearing in the theoretical limits below is a regularization cutoff which roughly corresponds to the energy scale where the structure of the $W$ boson becomes manifest.

105 ABE 95 g report $-1.3<\kappa<3.2$ for $\lambda=0$ and $-0.7<\lambda<0.7$ for $\kappa=1$ in $p \bar{p} \rightarrow e \nu_{e} \gamma X$ and $\mu \nu_{\mu} \gamma \mathrm{X}$ at $\sqrt{s}=1.8 \mathrm{TeV}$.
106 ALITTI 92C measure $\kappa=1_{-2.2}^{+2.6}$ and $\lambda=0_{-1.8}^{+1.7}$ in $p \bar{p} \rightarrow e \nu \gamma+X$ at $\sqrt{s}=630 \mathrm{GeV}$. At $95 \%$ CL they report $-3.5<\kappa<5.9$ and $-3.6<\lambda<3.5$.

From the anomalous magnetic moment of the muon, SUZUKI 85 obtains $|\Delta \kappa| \lesssim 2.2 / \ln \left(\Lambda / m_{W}\right)$. Finally SUZUKI 85 uses deviations from the $\rho$ parameter and obtains a very qualitative, order-of-magnitude limit $|\Delta \kappa| \lesssim 150\left(m_{W} / \Lambda\right)^{4}$ if $|\Delta \kappa| \ll$ 1.

## ANOMALOUS W/Z QUARTIC COUPLINGS

Written January 2001 by C. Caso (Univ. of Genova) and A. Gurtu (Tata Inst.)

The Standard Model predictions for $W W W W, W W Z Z$, $W W Z \gamma, W W \gamma \gamma$, and $Z Z \gamma \gamma$ couplings are small at LEP, but expected to become important at a TeV Linear Collider. Outside the Standard Model framework such possible couplings, $a_{0}, a_{c}, a_{n}$, are expressed in terms of the following dimension-6 operators [1,2];

where $F, W$ are photon and $W$ fields, $L_{6}^{0}$ and $L_{6}^{c}$ conserve $C, P$ separately and generate anomalous $W^{+} W^{-} \gamma \gamma$ and $Z Z \gamma \gamma$ couplings, $L_{6}^{n}$ violates $C P$ and generates an anomalous $W^{+} W^{-} Z \gamma$ coupling, and $\Lambda$ is a scale for new physics. For the $Z Z \gamma \gamma$ coupling the $C P$-violating term represented by $L_{6}^{n}$ does not contribute.

At LEP the processes studied in search of these quartic couplings are $e^{+} e^{-} \rightarrow W W \gamma, e^{+} e^{-} \rightarrow \gamma \gamma \nu \bar{\nu}$, and $e^{+} e^{-} \rightarrow$ $Z \gamma \gamma$ and limits are set on the quantities $a_{0} / \Lambda^{2}, a_{c} / \Lambda^{2}, a_{n} / \Lambda^{2}$. The sensitive measured variables are the cross sections for these processes as well as the energy and angular distributions of the photon and recoil mass to the photon pair.

Combining results from all LEP experiments and channels, the limits presented at the Osaka Conference [3] are $-0.0049<a_{0} / \Lambda^{2}<0.0056,-0.0054<a_{c} / \Lambda^{2}<0.0098$, $-0.45<a_{n} / \Lambda^{2}<0.41$.
